





R. A. PHILLIPS, J.P., found the following verdict:- "On the 29th. December, 1917 at Melbourne in No. 3. Australian Military Hospital Charles Joseph Oliver died from fractire of the skull and cerebral haemorrhage due to an accidental fall from a horse on the 22nd. December, 1917".



When opposite Pearce's slaughter yards about 1.30 p.m. a soldier passed me on horseback coming towards Camp, apparentely he was riding with his stirrups too long and he appeared to be a bad horseman, after he had passed by about 100 yards the horse shied off to the right and the rider fell, I rode up to him and turned him on his back. Macdonald arrived a few minutes later and I rode on to A.M.C. for Ambulance. Col. Morton arrived on scene a few minutes after Macdor and took charge of patient.

P.A.C. 5rd A.D..... I have to report concerning the circumstances in which Capt.C.J. Oliver Bet with his accident. This Officer was practically on duty at the time of the accident as he had been detailed for Camp duty during the Christmas week, Some time about 11 a.m. on the 22nd inst, he asked for and obtained permission to go out of Camp for an hour or two, as the Borningss work had been completed and nearly the whole camp had left on Christmas Leave. A little after mid-day, as he had not returned to Camp, I left myself, driving my own Car for Seymour, intending to complete some business in the Town, and if possible to pick up Capt Cliver, and return with him. I failed to meet him in the Yown, and left on return, a little after 1 p. H. and found him or the road just outside the Camp, being attended to by two cirilians, who stated that he had just fallen from his horse. He was then unconscious with stertorous breathing, and left hemiplegis. The ambulance arrived in a few minutes and he was taken to the Clearing Hospital, He remained unconscious all that afternoon, and became restless, and venited towards evening. Urine and faces were first involuntary and then retentive. The hemiplegis cleared up a good deal during Sturday night, but there was still some paresis. During Sanday he was able to answer questions, and recognise people, but was very restless, and delusional, this condition continued till he was sent away on sonday morning. I did not see Capt. Oliver, leave Camp, but understood that he obtained a lift in a passing buggy. He was sitting in a motor Car in Seymour, waiting to come out to Camp, when an army Service man passed, leading a spare horse, and he obtained the loan of the Horse, as there appeared to be little chance of the Car starting for Camp at that hour, and he was evidently anxious to return to lunch knowing that I wished to go out for the afternoon. The horse was known as a puller, and probably increased the pace as he neared the Camp, and turning sharply off the road towards his own lines. Capt Oliver, not being a good horseman, was unprepared for the swerve, and thrown heavily. I did not consider it advisable to send him immediately to the Base Hospital, on account of the possibility of intre-cranial hasmorrhage, which would no doubt have been aggregated by the long journey in extreme heat, and if the case had appeared urgent, was prepared to trephine myself, in the Seymour Private Hospital.

It is unfortunate that Capt Oliver impulsively decided to ride out, as he could have easily notified me by telephone, that no Cars were running, and I could have remained in Camp without the slightest inconvenience, until his return.



FIFTH WITNESS. OSBORNE CALVERT being duly sworn:-

"I am a Grazier residing "Glendoxey" Seymour. On Saturday 22/12/1917 I was returning from Seymour along Trawool Road. When oposite Pearce's Slaughter Yards about 1/30. p.m. a soldier passed me on horseback coming towards Camp, apparently he was riding with his stirrups too long and he appeared to be a bad horseman, after he had passed by about 100 yards the horse shied off to the right and the rider fell, I rode up to him and turned him on his back. MacDonald arrived a few minutes later and I rode on to A.M.C. for Ambulance. Col. Morton arrived on scene a few minutes after MacDonald and took charge of Patient. Patient.
